## Travelling on a wave of consciousness..!



Have you ever felt like whatever you do it's only a drop in the ocean, that as only one person you're powerless to affect the bigger problems the world faces? Sometimes we all need to be reminded that while on our own the challenge is overwhelming – if we work together anything is possible!

Think Freedom! our campaign on contemporary slavery, has been running for 4 months now. Already the message is being heard and understood on the Island.

This year we shared a stall with Amnesty International IoM at Tynwald Fair asking members of the public to help create a 'wave of consciousness'. All they had to do was cut out a teardrop shape and on it write a pledge they could keep to reduce their own personal connection with slave labour around the world. We collected many different ideas, including...

- Shop **ethically**
- **Question** retailers
- Make my **voice** heard
- Spend less on **consumer** products
- Join an **action** group
- Keep the **faith!**

As a community that enjoys relative wealth, and with many people for whom shopping is a hobby not a chore, think of our strength in numbers! If each of us were to take personal responsibility for our retail habits real changes could be made.

Already large stores like Marks and Spencer and Topshop are selling Fairtrade clothing, local companies like Shakti Man and Laxey Woolen Mills offer Fairtrade products that are not mass marketed and it's never been easier to buy Fairtrade food and drink.

Buying Fairtrade isn't the only way you can make a difference. By challenging retailers to be open about their labour standards and expressing your concerns you are taking action. Retailers supply the market to meet shoppers demands. If we can show them they have got it wrong – that we want to buy sweatshop free goods before buying a bargain they must respond!

Another pledge we collected was to 'Be a **responsible** traveler'. You may not be able to tell it's summer from the weather, but this is the busiest time of the year for holidays abroad – tourism is a huge

industry world wide. Many people may not know that working conditions in resorts offered by the 4 major tour operators are often . Long hours, hazardous equipment and little or no job security are just some examples of what employees might face. These conditions break international and national labour laws around the world.

Tourism Concern is running a campaign, sun, sand, sea and sweatshops, to ensure fair and legal labour conditions in the tourism industry. ([www.tourismconcern.org.uk](http://www.tourismconcern.org.uk)) There are other things you can do to be a responsible traveler.

~Where you can, buy from local people – which means your cash goes into the community.  
~Minimise your environmental impact. Think about what happens to your rubbish and be sensitive to limited resources like water, fuel and electricity.  
~Open your mind to a new culture!  
This year when you're booking your holiday look beyond the glossy brochure and book ethically!

### Armchair Activism

#### A great success, but there's more to do!

We often update you with campaigns from Survival International and it's wonderful to be able to share good news! Forty two Iban tribespeople from the rainforests of Malaysian Borneo were arrested in 1997 for defending their forest homeland against oil palm plantations recently won their case for wrongful arrest. Their lawyer Harrison Hgau said 'This victory brightens up our spirit in our struggle for the recognition of native land rights.' However, while we celebrate this success, action is urgently needed in other cases of indigenous people fighting to protect their land rights.

The Enawene Nawe live in an area of savannah and tropical rainforest in Mato Grosso state, western Brazil. They are a relatively isolated people who were first contacted in 1974. Unusually for an Amazonian tribe, they do not hunt eat red meat so fish is an essential part of their diet. Although most of their land was officially reconised in 1996, a crucial area called the Rio Preto, where the Indians gather each year to trap and smoke fish, was left out.

The area is being heavily invaded by Ranchers and recently the area's state government has announced plans to build hydroelectric dams upriver of the Enawene Nawe's land.

The Enawene are urgently pressing for this area to be protected from the loggers and soya who are destroying the forest and polluting the land and rivers.

Survival is lobbying the Brazillian government to recognise the Rio Preto region as Enawene Nawe land as a matter of urgency. Survival supports a land protection project run by the Enawene and the Brazilian non-governmental organisation OPAN.

# Footprints... An Eco Extravaganza!



**Again and again** we're told of the terrible consequences of Global Climate change. Ice caps melting, hundreds of millions of climate refugees, more severe weather patterns world wide. A bleak picture whichever way you look at it. Or is it....

A team of environmental experts and enthusiasts spent a day in Castle Rushen working with year seven students to look at the changes they can make to their own lifestyles which could make a difference.

Now in it's third year, Eco Day posed questions, offered solutions and encouraged the students to get active! 16 different workshops were offered with each student taking 3 of them. Groups were able to learn more about trees and how they grow with the Permaculture

society and Dalby Woodland. They investigated their local built environment with the Employers Federation and discovered more about recycling with Zero Waste Mann.

The Manx Organic Network ran a workshop and provided delicious organic snacks for the break. Wood sculpture, eco mural and a green film offered artistic options while government departments also took part. DLGE taught recycled paper making, DoT taught road safety, the wildlife park brought a number of creatures – including a boa constrictor, and the Manx Wildlife Trust & Wildflowers of Mann took the students on a nature walk. IoM Friends of the Earth was joined by their North West representative to talk about carbon footprints and Shakti Man ran a Fairtrade workshop. Castle Rushen itself organised a group building a hemp house complete with turf roofing, which will be used as a bicycle shed! The performance drama group Moving Sounds returned thanks to sponsorship from the Isle of Man Bank. This year they were also able to spend a whole day with year seven groups from the 5 state secondary schools with a great response from both teachers and students.

A group of students from the school performed celtic music, interspersed by sketches illustrating the climate change connections between the Isle of Man and the wider world. Many of the students who had worked with Moving sounds during the day returned and performed pieces they had created during the day, followed by a riot of music and the Embale, (the world's largest xylophone from Uganda!).

Audience participation was obligatory, the performers asked a simple question "Can we make a difference?" – the reply from the feet stomping, hand clapping audience?! **"Yes we can!"**

## The Kenya Experience begins...

Earlier this year 13 young adults were selected to travel to Kenya with the charity Excellent Development to help with a dam building project. The trip was sponsored by a number of local charities and companies and the chosen few were aged between 18 -24 but had left school at 16. Preparations included an orientation day at the OWC which explained what the participants should expect, and also prepared them for the cultural differences they were to come across. We look forward to hearing about their experiences on their return.



## A bright idea!

It seems like energy efficiency is catching on. Last year Australia became the first country to announce it was phasing our old-fashioned, energy wasting incandescent light bulbs. Since then most retailers have made commitments to remove inefficient light bulbs from their shelves by 2011 at the latest and in the UK Currys has already done so. Unfortunately, Woolworths are lagging behind. So far they've made no commitments to stop selling energy-wasting bulbs and have slapped excessively high prices on the few efficient bulbs they do sell.

Improving our energy efficiency is one of the easiest and cheapest ways to beat climate change, and getting rid of old fashioned light bulbs would be a good start. Talking to your local branch will have an enormous impact, especially if you insist that your concerns are passed on to head office.

## Thought for the future...

The One World Centre attended the annual higher education conference at Ballakermeen High School in June. We talked to students, parents and teachers over the 2 days about the variety of careers available in the voluntary sector, the types of degrees that would lead to an ethical career and how to chose an ethical gap year. There was a good response from the individuals we spoke to with many thoughtful questions asked. Ethical volunteering guides are available at the centre.

## Give Peace A Chance.

As the UN finally commits to sending peace keepers into Sudan, Amnesty International is asking you to help 'give peace a chance' and to support the call for action to help the people of Darfur. Amnesty recently released Instant Karma, an album of Lennon songs with a modern twist. All of the songs are covered by some of the biggest international names in music who came together to raise money for Amnesty International and to raise awareness of the organisation's work -especially over the human rights crisis in Darfur, Sudan.

Sudan is the largest country on the African continent, and it is in crisis. Since February 2003 the people of the Darfur region in Western Sudan have been caught up in a bitter conflict. The last 4 years have seen 3 million people displaced and 300,000 dead in Sudan and neighbouring countries. Civilians have borne the brunt of the conflict. Murder, rape, torture and mass forced displacement of civilians continue to be used as weapons of war. Amnesty is calling for action from the governments of the world to bring about an end to this humanitarian crisis and to hold the perpetrators to account.

## Rapid Response Coalition – Darfur and Chad Appeal

In 2005 there were (4) Disasters Emergency Committee (DEC) appeals, In 2006 there were none. Then in June 2007 the DEC announced it was launching an appeal for Darfur and Chad.

The purpose of the DEC is to act immediately when a crisis arises - therefore it can't be planned on a calendar months ahead. The IoM Rapid Response Coalition is set up to arrange street collections on the second weekend of the appeal – with the Darfur and Chad appeal this was the first weekend of TT week. Luckily we like a challenge and volunteers took to the streets around the Island on Friday and Saturday with orange buckets. Thanks to their hard work, and thanks to the public for their generosity we helped to raise almost £2000 for the Darfur and Chad appeal. The success of the collection is dependant on volunteers.
